A bit of a mixed forecast meant that we had only the committed for the trip up Y Gribin Ridge, Glyder Fawr and Y Garn, of Graham Daly, Lee Campbell, Larry King, Miles & Julie Tight and myself.



Lack of any space in any CC hut or CYB meant a comfy night in the Bangor Travelodge for me, £47 not bad value but the super bright lights in the car park fooled the local birds into kicking off the dawn chorus at 4.00am! ; just what I did not need after a 302 mile drive up.

Julie & Miles helpfully got Lee and Larry in their car, but Graham texted me at 6.33a.m. from Radbrook to say it was a windswept car park and was it still on, yes, "come & join us"!

We managed to get away by 8.45am in light drizzle and with cloud down to 800m or so. Miles set a fast pace, so fast he and I missed the spur off to Llyn Bochlwyd and had to back track 50 metres then on up the steps to the lake and onto the ridge where the rock was wet and greasy. then came a rightwards line onto the top of the ridge with Graham and I ascending an interesting and rather exposed rib for 50 feet or so while the others sensibly took a less exposed route to our left.

When we reach the top of the ridge we came out almost at the large cairn that marks the finish / descent. Of the many times I have scrambled up Y Gribin Ridge this was the only time that I have emerged so far to the right, it rather proves the ridge goes at grade 1 just about anywhere.

As we reached the summit plateau, still in cloud, we took out compasses and were about to take a rough bearing on Glyder Fawr but out came the sun and we were treated to great views that only got better.

The short walk over to Glyder Fawr was completed and an early lunch taken, with the odd snow patch being visible here and there. A debate ensued about which of the pinnacles of Glyder Fawr was higher, the one the Ogwen side or the far one. Some sitting on the pinnacles of the Ogwen side won for Miles, me and Larry. With the pressure rising it soon got pretty cold and I was keen to get moving after our short and early lunch at about 11.15a.m. down to the col we went.

For me virtually every other time I have done this descent it has been in snow but today it was wholly snow free and the extent of the ravages of the runoff of water from the plateau had caused deep channels in places.

At the col Miles set a furious & impressive pace up Y Garn before stopping to allow a regroup, I bashed on to get a couple of shots from the summit of our group on the final haul.

The summit of Y Garn to me is a special place as it has an excellent view from its slightly more isolated position; the sun was out and we had a second lunch. I took a picture of a group of girls and they returned the favour. In the sun and out of the wind it was nice place to sit although Julie was concerned about a party in the summit ring knocking a loose rock off down onto me; fortunately, no such incident took place as it would have been sub optimal.

Down we bashed in great weather and were back at Ogwen Cottage by 3.00pm, Larry kindly bought me and I think others a coffee, thanks! We said our goodbyes and made our way home from the free car park towards Tryfan, I got away at 3.45pm arriving home at 9.30pm. Others rather earlier!

A super day and thank you to Graham, Lee, Larry, Miles & Julie for turning up.

Adrian Donnelly, 26th Sept 1961 – 30th November 2025.



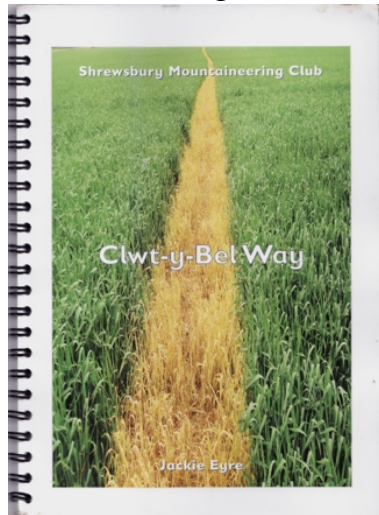
Adrian joined the Club in 1987 and remained a member until 2020. He was also known as 'tick tock man'. He excelled as a fell runner and received the Harry Gregory Trophy in 2010 after finishing the 100-mile Grand Raid des Pyrenees, with 10,000 metres of ascent and descent, in 37 hours and 58 minutes.

At his packed Quaker memorial service at Norbury village hall many friends stood up to recount tales and affirm what a thoroughly lovely man he was with time to help anyone in need. He was particularly valued by the Scouts and the Long Mynd Hike.

He is buried on his own land on the edge of the Mynd with a beautiful view. R.I.P. Adrian

Solo or group: Always prefer a group but with sufficient space for selfish contemplation.

Favourite bit of kit: Stance technical underpants (mens)....a revelation!

Favourite climb: never have enjoyed cragging but do love to play in the snow therefore my biggest achievement is a Scottish winter classic: Centre Post Direct on Coire Ardair buttress on the marvellous Creag Meagaidh....a special day in perfect conditions. 6 hours of utter commitment, adrenaline, self-doubt and some terror! Done but never again!!

Proudest moment in the hills: 15 years ago summiting Mont Blanc du Tacul with my teenage daughter Meg. Roped together I tentatively lead her down the Midi Arete, through the crevasses of the Vallee Blanche, over the bergschrund and around the seracs, and ultimately over the short rocky scramble to the jaw dropping summit; but whilst sharing this incredible moment with Meg a realisation hitmy wee girl was becoming a woman and would no longer critically depend on me; poignantly she led the route back down, even up the daunting Midi Arete. Our relationship had changed forever; she has been in charge ever since!



Mountaineering tip: Never skimp on underwear.... invest in high quality technical pants; never underestimate the value of personal comfort on the hill. Socks too!

The Glyders, January 4th 2026.

Like many of you I've probably climbed the Glyders on numerous occasions but the tendency was to climb from either Y Garn / Devils Kitchen or from Tryfan so this time I decided to try something different and climb up the hills from Pen y Pass using the red dot path that starts behind the YHA.

In normal conditions the walk would be a bimbble but this was a completely different undertaking with 20cms plus of deep powder snow! I arrived the evening before and parked in the layby near the PYG hotel despite originally intending to stay at Clwt y Bel which was almost



inaccessible due to snow and ice. When I arrived at the layby the roads were clear with only a small amount of snow but the following morning it was a completely different story following a massive dump of snow overnight. The rest of the gang arrived around 0900 and 10 intrepid explorers headed off up the pass and onto the hill.

To say it was tough going is an understatement, it was flipping hard work by any standard trying to break trail to the summit of Glyder Fawr, often through waist deep snow. We were the first and probably only group mad enough to try the route that morning.



Atop the Glyders was a lot less problematic, and we certainly made better progress over to Glyder Fach, although we were occasionally in whiteout conditions.

From here we cut down to the cars. I would **like** to say we used the Miners track but all I **can** say is that we in the proximity of it as it definitely wasn't visible. Needless to say, the accumulated snow wasn't going to make the return trip any easier so after we had floundered or fallen over in the snow laughing at ourselves as we tried to stand up, we eventually made it back to the cars some 8 hours later.

This was definitely a tough day but despite being knackered I think everyone enjoyed this full-on winter day. Thanks to everyone for your efforts.
